The objective of the Stakeholder Forum is to provide a venue for the Government of Myanmar, together with its employers and workers social partners, to engage with international investors, development partners and civil society representatives on its ongoing reform efforts; to review progress made on labour law reform and institutional capacity building; to provide guidance and recommendations for the development of a multi-year labour law reform and capacity building plan (labour law reform plan); and to foster constructive relationships among domestic and international stakeholders. 		The speakers will be given a maximum of 7 minutes each to present their perspectives on the topic and will pose questions to the participants to stimulate discussion. The Government representative/moderator will make a final response to the issues raised in each session.

This session also will present good success stories on enterprise level collective bargaining, which is generally conducted during dispute settlement, and identify ways to promote and institutionalise sound bargaining techniques.
